




# Fall into Early Literacy

## Play

Sensory play provides children with hands-on experiences that strengthen their cognitive skills.

## Sing

While singing, children develop listening and cooperative skills, coordination of the tongue and lips, gross and fine motor skills, self-control, concentration skills and memory!

### ALL THE LEAVES ARE FALLING DOWN

Tune: "London Bridges Falling Down"

All the leaves are falling down, falling down, falling down (Imitate leaves falling down)  
All the leaves are falling down, it is fall.

Take the rake and rake them up, rake them up, rake them up (Imitate raking leaves)  
Take the rake and rake them up, it is fall.

Make a pile and jump right in, jump right in, jump right in, (Children jump forward)  
Make a pile and jump right in, it is fall.

## Write

Writing for preschoolers doesn't have to mean tracing letters! Before they can hold a pencil, they need to develop other skills such as coordination, precision and hand strength.

### Try this!

Cut slits in a shoe box or a plastic container lid and ask your child to put coins, buttons, plastic bingo chips or other small objects inside. To make it more challenging, add numbers, colors or alphabets!



## Talk

Talk with your child in your first language! When children have a strong first language base, they learn a second language more easily, and tend to do better at school with reading and writing.
